MAY 6

Read 1 Chronicles 22-24

CHAPTER 22

THEN David said, This *is* the house of the LORD God, and this *is* the altar of the burnt offering for Israel.

- 2 And David commanded to gather together the strangers that *were* in the land of Israel; and he set masons to hew wrought stones to build the house of God.
- 3 And David prepared iron in abundance for the nails for the doors of the gates, and for the joinings; and brass in abundance without weight;
- 4 Also cedar trees in abundance: for the Zidonians and they of Tyre brought much cedar wood to David.
- 5 And David said, Solomon my son *is* young and tender, and the house *that is* to be builded for the LORD *must be* exceeding magnifical, of fame and of glory throughout all countries: I will *therefore* now make preparation for it. So David prepared abundantly before his death.
- 6 ¶ Then he called for Solomon his son, and charged him to build an house for the LORD God of Israel.

- 7 And David said to Solomon, My son, as for me, it was in my mind to build an house unto the name of the LORD my God:
- 8 But the word of the LORD came to me, saying, Thou hast shed blood abundantly, and hast made great wars: thou shalt not build an house unto my name, because thou hast shed much blood upon the earth in my sight.
- 9 Behold, a son shall be born to thee, who shall be a man of rest; and I will give him rest from all his enemies round about: for his name shall be Solomon, and I will give peace and quietness unto Israel in his days.
- 10 He shall build an house for my name; and he shall be my son, and I *will be* his father; and I will establish the throne of his kingdom over Israel for ever.
- 11 Now, my son, the LORD be with thee; and prosper thou, and build the house of the LORD thy God, as he hath said of thee.
- 12 Only the LORD give thee wisdom and understanding, and give

thee charge concerning Israel, that thou mayest keep the law of the LORD thy God.

- 13 Then shalt thou prosper, if thou takest heed to fulfil the statutes and judgments which the LORD charged Moses with concerning Israel: be strong, and of good courage; dread not, nor be dismayed.
- 14 Now, behold, in my trouble I have prepared for the house of the LORD an hundred thousand talents of gold, and a thousand thousand talents of silver; and of brass and iron without weight; for it is in abundance: timber also and stone have I prepared; and thou mayest add thereto.
- 15 Moreover *there are* workmen with thee in abundance, hewers and workers of stone and timber, and all manner of cunning men for every manner of work.
- 16 Of the gold, the silver, and the brass, and the iron, *there is* no number. Arise *therefore*, and be doing, and the LORD be with thee.
- 17 ¶ David also commanded all the princes of Israel to help Solomon his son, *saying*,
- 18 *Is* not the LORD your God with you? and hath he *not* given you rest on every side? for he hath

given the inhabitants of the land into mine hand; and the land is subdued before the LORD, and before his people.

19 Now set your heart and your soul to seek the LORD your God; arise therefore, and build ye the sanctuary of the LORD God, to bring the ark of the covenant of the LORD, and the holy vessels of God, into the house that is to be built to the name of the LORD.

CHAPTER 23

- So when David was old and full of days, he made Solomon his son king over Israel.
- 2 And he gathered together all the princes of Israel, with the priests and the Levites.
- 3 Now the Levites were numbered from the age of thirty years and upward: and their number by their polls, man by man, was thirty and eight thousand.
- 4 Of which, twenty and four thousand *were* to set forward the work of the house of the LORD; and six thousand *were* officers and judges:
- 5 Moreover four thousand were porters; and four thousand praised the LORD with the instruments which I made, said David, to praise therewith.

- 6 And David divided them into courses among the sons of Levi, *namely*, Gershon, Kohath, and Merari.
- 7 ¶ Of the Gershonites were, Laadan, and Shimei.
- 8 The sons of Laadan; the chief was Jehiel, and Zetham, and Joel, three.
- 9 The sons of Shimei; Shelomith, and Haziel, and Haran, three. These *were* the chief of the fathers of Laadan.
- 10 And the sons of Shimei were, Jahath, Zina, and Jeush, and Beriah. These four were the sons of Shimei.
- 11 And Jahath was the chief, and Zizah the second: but Jeush and Beriah had not many sons; therefore they were in one reckoning, according to *their* father's house.
- 12 ¶ The sons of Kohath; Amram, Izhar, Hebron, and Uzziel, four.
- 13 The sons of Amram; Aaron and Moses: and Aaron was separated, that he should sanctify the most holy things, he and his sons for ever, to burn incense before the LORD, to minister unto him, and to bless in his name for ever.
 - 14 Now concerning Moses the

- man of God, his sons were named of the tribe of Levi.
- 15 The sons of Moses *were*, Gershom, and Eliezer.
- 16 Of the sons of Gershom, Shebuel *was* the chief.
- 17 And the sons of Eliezer *were*, Rehabiah the chief. And Eliezer had none other sons; but the sons of Rehabiah were very many.
- 18 Of the sons of Izhar; Shelomith the chief.
- 19 Of the sons of Hebron; Jeriah the first, Amariah the second, Jahaziel the third, and Jekameam the fourth.
- 20 Of the sons of Uzziel; Michah the first, and Jesiah the second.
- 21 ¶ The sons of Merari; Mahli, and Mushi. The sons of Mahli; Eleazar, and Kish.
- 22 And Eleazar died, and had no sons, but daughters: and their brethren the sons of Kish took them.
- 23 The sons of Mushi; Mahli, and Eder, and Jeremoth, three.
- 24 ¶ These were the sons of Levi after the house of their fathers; even the chief of the fathers, as they were counted by number of names by their polls, that did the work for the service of the house of the LORD, from the age of twenty years and upward.

- 25 For David said, The LORD God of Israel hath given rest unto his people, that they may dwell in Jerusalem for ever:
- 26 And also unto the Levites; they shall no *more* carry the tabernacle, nor any vessels of it for the service thereof.
- 27 For by the last words of David the Levites *were* numbered from twenty years old and above:
- 28 Because their office was to wait on the sons of Aaron for the service of the house of the LORD, in the courts, and in the chambers, and in the purifying of all holy things, and the work of the service of the house of God;
- 29 Both for the shewbread, and for the fine flour for meat offering, and for the unleavened cakes, and for *that which is baked in* the pan, and for that which is fried, and for all manner of measure and size;
- 30 And to stand every morning to thank and praise the LORD, and likewise at even;
- 31 And to offer all burnt sacrifices unto the LORD in the sabbaths, in the new moons, and on the set feasts, by number, according to the order commanded unto them, continually before the LORD:
 - 32 And that they should keep

the charge of the tabernacle of the congregation, and the charge of the holy *place*, and the charge of the sons of Aaron their brethren, in the service of the house of the LORD.

CHAPTER 24

Now these are the divisions of the sons of Aaron. The sons of Aaron; Nadab, and Abihu, Eleazar, and Ithamar.

- 2 But Nadab and Abihu died before their father, and had no children: therefore Eleazar and Ithamar executed the priest's office.
- 3 And David distributed them, both Zadok of the sons of Eleazar, and Ahimelech of the sons of Ithamar, according to their offices in their service.
- 4 And there were more chief men found of the sons of Eleazar than of the sons of Ithamar; and thus were they divided. Among the sons of Eleazar there were sixteen chief men of the house of their fathers, and eight among the sons of Ithamar according to the house of their fathers.
- 5 Thus were they divided by lot, one sort with another; for the governors of the sanctuary, and governors of the house of God, were of the sons of Eleazar, and of the sons of Ithamar.

- 6 And Shemaiah the son of Nethaneel the scribe, *one* of the Levites, wrote them before the king, and the princes, and Zadok the priest, and Ahimelech the son of Abiathar, and *before* the chief of the fathers of the priests and Levites: one principal household being taken for Eleazar, and *one* taken for Ithamar.
- 7 Now the first lot came forth to Jehoiarib, the second to Jedaiah,
- 8 The third to Harim, the fourth to Seorim,
- 9 The fifth to Malchijah, the sixth to Mijamin,
- 10 The seventh to Hakkoz, the eighth to Abijah,
- 11 The ninth to Jeshua, the tenth to Shecaniah,
- 12 The eleventh to Eliashib, the twelfth to Jakim,
- 13 The thirteenth to Huppah, the fourteenth to Jeshebeab,
- 14 The fifteenth to Bilgah, the sixteenth to Immer,
- 15 The seventeenth to Hezir, the eighteenth to Aphses,
- 16 The nineteenth to Pethahiah, the twentieth to Jehezekel,
- 17 The one and twentieth to Jachin, the two and twentieth to Gamul,

- 18 The three and twentieth to Delaiah, the four and twentieth to Maaziah.
- 19 These *were* the orderings of them in their service to come into the house of the LORD, according to their manner, under Aaron their father, as the LORD God of Israel had commanded him.
- 20 ¶ And the rest of the sons of Levi were these: Of the sons of Amram; Shubael: of the sons of Shubael; Jehdeiah.
- 21 Concerning Rehabiah: of the sons of Rehabiah, the first *was* Isshiah.
- 22 Of the Izharites; Shelomoth: of the sons of Shelomoth; Jahath.
- 23 And the sons of Hebron; Jeriah the first, Amariah the second, Jahaziel the third, Jekameam the fourth.
- 24 Of the sons of Uzziel; Michah: of the sons of Michah; Shamir.
- 25 The brother of Michah was Isshiah: of the sons of Isshiah; Zechariah.
- 26 The sons of Merari were Mahli and Mushi: the sons of Jaaziah; Beno.
- 27 ¶ The sons of Merari by Jaaziah; Beno, and Shoham, and Zaccur, and Ibri.

- 28 Of Mahli *came* Eleazar, who had no sons.
- 29 Concerning Kish: the son of Kish *was* Jerahmeel.
- 30 The sons also of Mushi; Mahli, and Eder, and Jerimoth. These *were* the sons of the Levites after the house of their fathers.

DEVOTIONAL COMMENTS

In chapter 22 the judgment had passed. The Lord had answered prayer, and David was restored to fellowship. He then instructed Solomon regarding the building of a house for the Lord. It is noteworthy that David could not be involved in advancing the work of the Lord until his own heart was right. The Lord does not use dirty vessels.

Too often people who are genuinely born-again cannot be used of God because there is sin in their lives. Many times I have counseled with young people and adults alike who have struggled with serving the Lord, but have never met with any measure of success. My advice to them is to examine their own lives to see what could be separating God's blessings from them. God's Word says, "But your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid his face from you, that he will not hear" (Isaiah 59:2). If we are to be of service to God, we must come as clean vessels, set apart for His service and meet for the Master's use.

In chapter 23 David made Solomon king. David was 70 years old at the time. Afterwards, he devoted himself still more to the house of the Lord. He ordered and arranged everything, so that when the Temple was built, Solomon had only to follow the directions given him by his spiritual father. Solomon had the privilege of having a godly father who could teach him the ways of the Lord.

Also in this chapter we read of 24,000 Levites being set apart for the Lord's service, and we will see in the next few chapters the responsibilities that are given to various persons.

PROVERB FOR TODAY

"Turn not to the right hand nor to the left: remove thy foot from evil" (Proverbs 4:27).

31 These likewise cast lots over against their brethren the sons of Aaron in the presence of David the king, and Zadok, and Ahimelech, and the chief of the fathers of the priests and Levites, even the principal fathers over against their younger brethren.

HYMN FOR TODAY

HOW GREAT THOU ART! English words by Stuart K. Hine, 1899-

Today's inspiring hymn of praise and adoration reminds us of God's unlimited power and love in creation and redemption. Although written in the past century, the hymn has become familiar to congregations just since the close of World War II. It especially became an international favorite after the Billy Graham Evangelistic Team used it in their crusades during the late 1940's and early 1950's.

The original text was written by a Swedish pastor, Carl Boberg, in 1886. While visiting a beautiful country estate, Boberg was caught in a sudden thunderstorm. The awesome and violent lightning and thunder quickly ended, leaving clear brilliant sunshine and the calm, sweet singing of the birds in the trees. Falling on his knees in awe and adoration of Almighty God, the pastor wrote nine stanzas of praise. Swedish congregations began to sing his lines to one of their old folk tunes. The text was later translated into German and Russian and ultimately into English by the Reverent S.K. Hine and his wife, English missionaries to the people of the Ukraine. When war broke out in 1939, it was necessary for the Hines to return to Britain, where Mr. Hine added the fourth stanza to this hymn. These four stanzas by Stuart Hine have since ministered and inspired God's people worldwide.

O Lord my God, when I in awesome wonder consider all the worlds Thy hands have made, I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder, Thy pow'r thruout the universe displayed! When thru the woods and forest glades I wander and hear the birds sing sweetly in the trees, when I look down from lofty mountain grandeur and hear the brook and feel the gentle breeze.

And when I think that God, His Son not sparing, sent Him to die, I scarce can take it in—
That on the cross, my burden gladly bearing,
He bled and died to take away my sin!

When Christ shall come with shout of acclamation and take me home, what joy shall fill my heart! Then I shall bow in humble adoration and there proclaim,

my God, how great Thou art!

THE STORY OF THE PSALMS Psalm 38

AUTHOR: Job

THE STORY BEHIND THE PSALM

Read carefully Job 42:1-6; then read the 38th Psalm. You will find an amazing similarity. Job had stood the test. God had allowed Satan to try him, and Job did not turn his back upon God. In one of the most marvelous displays of loyalty ever known, Job stood the test and kept his promise that even if God should slay him, he would still trust Him. However, when Job had stood the test and God had given him twice as much as he had before, Job became proud. How tragic it is that even in our highest hour, we are tempted to sin, and even in the holiest of duties, we stoop to human deeds! Job became proud of himself and God rebuked him severely. This drives Job to the ash heap to repent as is found in Job 42:1-6. Of course, God forgives him, and Job's temporary lapse does not tarnish our faith in him. It simply reminds us that he is human. I think that God places such a sin in the Bible to show us that all of us are human and potential backsliders. Abraham lied about Sarah. Paul took a Jewish vow. Noah was drunken. Moses lost his temper and smote the rock twice and numbered the people and was forbidden to enter into the promised land. Peter cursed and swore and denied that he belonged to the Saviour. David had his sin with Bathsheba and Uriah. God is reminding us that the best of men are men at best.

There is something very sweet in the story of Job. After Job had lost his sheep, his asses, his camels, his oxen and his children and, yea, all that he had, he stood the test and did not charge the Lord. After he had proved himself, God gave him back twice as many asses and twice as many sheep and twice as many camels and twice as many oxen, but He gave him the same number of children that he had before—ten. This used to bother me until one day it dawned on me. Job did have twice as many children as he had before. When an ox dies, it's dead. When an ass dies, it's dead. When a camel dies, it's dead. When a sheep dies, it's dead. When a child dies, it is not dead. Job did have twice as many children—he simply had ten on earth and ten in Heaven. Praise God!

THE WAY IT WAS USED BY GOD'S PEOPLE

When a Hebrew sought repentance, he would often come to the 38th Psalm. It would lead him to repent of his sin. This is another of the penitential Psalms.
